Dock Repair



Many of you may have noticed that the rickety boat dock at NE 166th and Airport Way had a makeover in August of this year. New decking and floatation has turned this dock into a rock solid place to launch into the upper slough near the Big Four Corners wetland area. The Portland Water Bureau, Bureau of Environmental Services and the Council came together to fund the repair of the dock, which had been vandalized and non-functional since August 2010. The dock is located on Portland Water Bureau property. Folks are urged to utilize the dock and nearby trailhead, and to call the Water Bureau at 503-823-6084 if they notice any suspicious behavior near the dock. Check out the new dock for yourself sometime this fall!

Summer Interns



The Council had help this summer from Alfredo Urbina and Misael Calcano, two students from the Mt Hood Community College's SEED program. Alfredo (from Honduras) and Misael (from the Dominican Republic) are completing a 2-year program in natural resource management with the intention of returning to their home countries to implement their knowledge. They completed their summer internship with the Council by assisting with summer events, the Great Slough Clean Up, raingarden upkeep, and wildlife surveys at Whitaker Ponds. Their fellow SEED students volunteered as well at Explorando.

Moonlight Paddle



The Council's second-ever Moonlight Paddle was a hit as 41 participants and 9 staff & volunteers gathered on August 12th for a nighttime paddle. Groups explored the Slough in the dark with headlamps and glowsticks—though many discovered that there is easily enough ambient light on the Slough to find your way at night. Slough School Mentors

Every year, from mid-January through the end of March, Slough School works with hundreds of students in native habitat restoration. They love digging mud, we love the hands-on science, and the plants love to get their roots in the soil. However, as you can imagine, it can be tricky to wrangle a group of 12-15 nine year olds and a few armfuls of plants (not to mention trowels) and get the plants in effectively.

Enter MYC. The Multnomah Youth Cooperative is a high school program housed at Reynolds Learning Academy, located at the eastern edge of the watershed in Fairview. With their support, there is a high school student working with almost every younger student. Mud is enjoyed, science taught, and every plant is planted well.

One crisp, winter morning, the MYC crew leader and I began to scheme. She loved the ownership and pride that her students took from mentoring. I wanted to share their skills with more schools. So we

launched a program, Salish Ponds Days, in which MYC students develop and lead stations for students from Salish Ponds Elementary. The program went so well that we began right away to plan for the next year. Last year, all three of the second grades participated. We were making strides.

As the school year ended, I was extremely proud of the MYC students and of all we had accomplished, but, something was missing. I wanted to know the MYC students from the start, to support them as they cultivated their skills as educators. Some of them might serve as student leaders for Outdoor School, work at a summer camp, and perhaps one or two would go on to become educators themselves. I wanted Slough School to be able to encourage that growth.

This fall we dove right in. Not just a jumble of classes here and there thrown together, but a carefully plotted schedule designed to prepare students to become



strong mentors. A series of classroom programs on local watershed ecology and mentoring skills, a field day for training, a fall mentoring opportunity with yet another Reynolds school, mentoring planting dates in the winter, more classroom support, further educational programs, and finally, three more Salish Ponds Days programs.

As the sun shone on our first mentoring field trip this fall, I was reminded how special it is to watch someone you have supported step up and take on their own role as an educator. Watching young children learn from them is magical, and you know the experience will stay with them. Through these experiences we are truly cultivating the next generation of watershed stewards.

Regatta's New Location a Hit

The 17th Annual Columbia Slough Regatta was held on Sunday, July 31st this year. That morning dawned with light fog that quickly burned off to a sunny 80 degree day. 463 people came out to enjoy the festivities, making 195 boat launches into the Slough near Big Four Corners.

It was a challenge this year to determine the best location for the Regatta, which typically rotates each year through sites in the Lower, Middle, and Upper Slough. After changes at the Portland Water Bureau Canoe Launch at NE 166th & Airport Way, the Council has been unable to use this Upper Slough site for the huge crowds at each Regatta. Luckily, some brainstorming from the Regatta Planning Committee revealed the potential of a perfect new Upper Slough site at NE 150th Ct & Mason. The site's owners, Tri-State Construction, graciously donated the use of this site to the Council for the weekend. Participant feedback indicates that this site was one of the most popular in recent Regatta history, and the Council hopes to work with Tri-State Construction again for a future Regatta.
